SB 244 (Wolk): Requires local land use planning to include improvement of disadvantaged communities.

Tom Torlakson): Connects health and fitness to
academic success.

AB 9 "Seth's Law" (Ammiano) AB 1156 (Eng): Prevents bullying.

SB 429 (DeSaulnier): Makes schools with After School Education and Safety Programs eligible to receive a supplemental operations grant.

AB 1330 and AB 790 (Furutani): Establish the Linked Learning Pilot Program and adds career technical education to high school graduation requirements.

AB 402 (Skinner): Uses information from school lunch programs to determine CalFresh eligibility for low-income families.



What is success?




