Happy New Year!

2013-2014 was a busy year for the CPI Project! As we reflect on the year, we would like to share some highlights with you.

- 3,956 prevention professionals were trained in either onsite, online, or webinar trainings;
- 57 of the 58 counties accessed at least one of the CPI services;
- Online and webinar trainings were popular outside of California, with 81 people accessing these services via the CPI website; and
- 17 counties received individual support as they revised their prevention plans.

For 2015 we look forward to continuing to support the prevention field with onsite trainings, personalized consultation services, and online and webinar trainings that can be accessed 24/7. California School-Based Health Alliance and the California Pan-Ethnic Health Network (CPEHN) (2015)

This report funded by The California Endowment provides multiple strategies that reflect best practices for working with middle-and high-school-aged boys and young men of color. From the preface: "With the continued rollout of health care reform, health care providers work to be more responsive to patient needs and provide consumer centered care. For many providers, perhaps even for your practice, this means seeking recognition as a Patient Centered Health Home. A lot of information and resources are available about the health home model and how it can be used to better serve different populations. However, few of these resources address the needs of boys and young men of color, who face alarming health disparities and serious challenges to their health and wellbeing. This paper offers suggestions for both modest and ambitious steps that your practice can take to create effective health homes for boys and young men of color." *Read the full the report*.


United Health Foundation, American Public Health Association, and the Partnership for Prevention (Dec 10, 2014)

Leading Change: A Plan for SAMHSA's Roles and Actions 2011-2014 Accomplishments Report

Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) (Dec 18, 2014) This report highlights key accomplishments the agency has achieved through its strategic initiatives, includes information on how SAMHSA has expanded health coverage and access, and increased substance abuse and mental health efforts with an emphasis on prescription drug misuse and underage drinking. SAMHSA utilized the initiatives to increase public awareness and understanding about behavioral health and how it is essential to overall health. By creating partnerships across systems including housing, criminal justice, the military, veterans care, and child welfare, SAMHSA is able to serve more people with unique and urgent needs. *Read the full report.*




2014 Monitoring the Future Survey

National Institutes of Health (NIH)

National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) (Dec 16, 2014)

The use of cigarettes and alcohol and the abuse of prescription pain medications has declined among teens in continuation of a two-decade trend while marijuana use rates remain stable. Use of e-cigarettes is measured in the report for the first time and reported use is high while the perception that marijuana is harmful is low. "With the rates of many drugs decreasing, and the rates of marijuana use appearing to level off, it is possible that prevention efforts are having an effect," said NIDA Director Nora D. Volkow, M.D. "It is now more important than ever for the public health community to continue to educate teens, parents, teachers, community leaders, the media and health care providers about the specific harms of drug use among teens, whose brains are still developing." 2013 Prescription Drug Overdose Prevention Status Report

Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)

Mortality data for 2013 was released by CDC. While drug deaths related to prescription painkillers have remained stable since 2012 following sharp rises over the previous decade, deaths related to heroin use have increased for the third year in a row, with an increase of 39 percent since 2012. CDC and other agencies are working to identify and evaluate interventions to reduce overdose deaths. SAMHSA's budget provides \$12 million to expand treatment services for opioid dependence and CDC provides \$20 million to prevent prescription drug abuse. The CDC publishes Prevention Status Reports (PSRs) that focus on policies and practices supported by emerging evidence, expert consensus, and/or extensive review of the primary drivers of the epidemic. *View California's 2013 PSR*.

Culturally Responsive Environmental Prevention Tactic
